Who We Are

The Classrooms Without Borders (CWB) Study Seminar Program provides professional development for teaching about the Holocaust, Racial Justice, Genocide, and/or Peace Building. The program aims to deepen educators' understanding of these topics and equip them with effective teaching strategies and contains three phases. We also accept outstanding students and community learners.

Phase 1

Participants attend six pre-travel, meetings, held in person and/or via ZOOM, including scholarly lectures and robust exploration to introduce and reinforce the content.

Phase 2

Participants travel to a location selected according to the topical content for ca. 7-10 days. The travel portion includes workshops led by experts in the field and educational sessions at relevant museums and sites.

Phase 3

All participants are required to hold at least one Witness in the Living Room session; educators/administrators create a project defined by their needs, under the guidance of CWB.

The registration fee for seminar applicants is \$500 and is non-refundable. The \$500 registration fee will be applied as credit towards the remaining seminar fee. GCU applicants are exempt from the registration fee.

The deadline for application submission is December 15, 2024.

Please note that the application must be completed in one sitting, which typically takes approximately 20 minutes. We recommend drafting your essays in this Word document before starting the application process.
